## Other Projects needing help -

- 1 kitchen raised garden beds:
  - o dig out weeds, help children plant vegetable and flower seeds & seedlings, make a shadecloth cover (we have the cloth and some piping)
- 2 School Planting:
  - a. Digging out the old amphitheatre (big bank from the oval to the school) and marking spots for plants.
  - b. Digging various other spots.
- 3 Tidy greenhouse:
  - a. Soaking pots, sweeping, filling pots with soil; planting seedlings into pots.
- 4 Compost:-

- a. tumble compost, wheelbarrow some to kitchen gardens.
- 5 Bushland planting:
  - a. Since the fire, an area is growing back beautifully. There are some spots needing plans. We have some help from the Joondalup Council for this.
- 6 Selling Plants, fire bricks and worm wizz (profits to P&C)
  - a. Preparing to take trolleys up to the school before school pick your days!
  - b. Using our white square to sell plants, paper bricks, sundries and worm wiz.

## Bring in those containers - 7c each

We have just changed over to have our containers collected by 'Recollect'.

They do charge 3c per container for the service – money well spent. New bins are going into the cage and will be collected as needed. Money is deposited directly into the P&C account. Most homes recycle wine, spirit and milk bottles into their yellow bins, that's great as they do not take these. On-the-go drink containers are the problem ones to collect. **Just toss containers into a box or crate at home**, *especially after a party*, and bring them to school on a Friday. They can be crushed but must be recognisable. A crate will stop leaking in your car – go on give to your P&C! The cage is near the greenhouse at 'Alfreton Road' side of school, will be open from 8:30 till 3:15 every Friday of the school term.

7 Mr Rowland has collected about \$3.00 worth, this week, from around the school grounds. This is a bag-full of landfill saved – Thank you Mr Rowland!

### Recollect Information

• Eligible containers must be included on the scheme's list of products and display the refund mark (e.g. "10¢ at collection depots/points in participating State/Territory of purchase").

#### OK

- Drink containers made of plastic, glass, aluminum, and liquid paperboard that are 150ml 3L:
  - o Soft drink cans and bottles
  - o Bottled waters both plastic and glass
  - o Small flavoured milk drinks
  - o Juice boxes and poppers
  - Beer and cider cans and bottles
  - o Spirit-based mixed drinks
  - o Sports drinks
- Just toss them into a bin.
  - These items aren't accepted, but can still go into household recycling:
    - o Containers less than 150ml and greater than 3L
    - Plain milk containers
    - Glass wine bottles
    - Glass spirit bottles
    - Containers 1L or larger which have contained flavoured milk, pure fruit, or vegetable juice
    - All cordial or syrup containers
    - o Registered health tonics
    - Crushed or broken containers
